Heart of Philanthropy

The word philanthropy translates to “a love (philos) of mankind (anthropos).” It is in acting with heartfelt intention, truly centered on that meaning of philanthropy, that we have and will continue to support our community.

2022 in many ways felt like a re-emergence, a move towards normalcy after the turbulent years of the COVID-19 pandemic. We were able to hold in-person events, including a joyous return to our Friends of the Foundation and scholarship recognition luncheon.

But 2022 was not without its difficulties.

Economic uncertainty loomed large throughout the year. Inflation surged. Prices were up at the gas pump, in grocery stores, and most places central in our lives.

What role does philanthropy play in times like we faced and continue to face today?

At the Cattaraugus Region Community Foundation, philanthropy is a huge part of the answer to those problems.

We believe that philanthropy – our love of mankind, our love of our fellow neighbor, at its core, serves to make the world a better place by tackling head-on the issues that a community faces and by supporting the projects and initiatives that improve the lives of our neighbors.

In 2022, CRCF funds made possible over \$2.3 million in grants to nonprofits that serve to improve the lives of those in our Cattaraugus County region through grants that address immediate needs such as support for food pantries that tackle the issue of rising food costs, support for nonprofits facing rising operating costs and tighter budgets, grants that provide financial support to those facing difficult medical diagnoses & extensive treatment and more.

CRCF also made possible over \$250,000 in scholarships to allow area students to pursue their educational and career aspirations. The hope is that many of those students will consider returning to the area to enrich the community with the knowledge and talents they are to discover.

In this report you will read more about the specifics of that “heart of philanthropy” ethos that guides the funding decisions our board makes.

Of that review process, fellow board member and grant allocations committee member Mary Freeman wrote:

“Hard decisions are made on allocating donor funds to deserving groups. This exercise requires prudence, a listening heart, and sometimes tough conversations—on which projects will bring the greatest comfort, build the strongest resilience, and ensure the best quality of life for our community members.”

The world today needs HOPE, and CRCF breathes that HOPE into the communities we serve and the lives of the people in our communities. Today, all of us—donors, staff, board and committee members—are instruments of delivering that HOPE, and there is no greater gift than knowing we have been a part of this endeavor.”

We speak for our entire board and staff and the donors that make this work possible, when we say we believe that mandate of delivering hope is the heart of our philanthropic work.

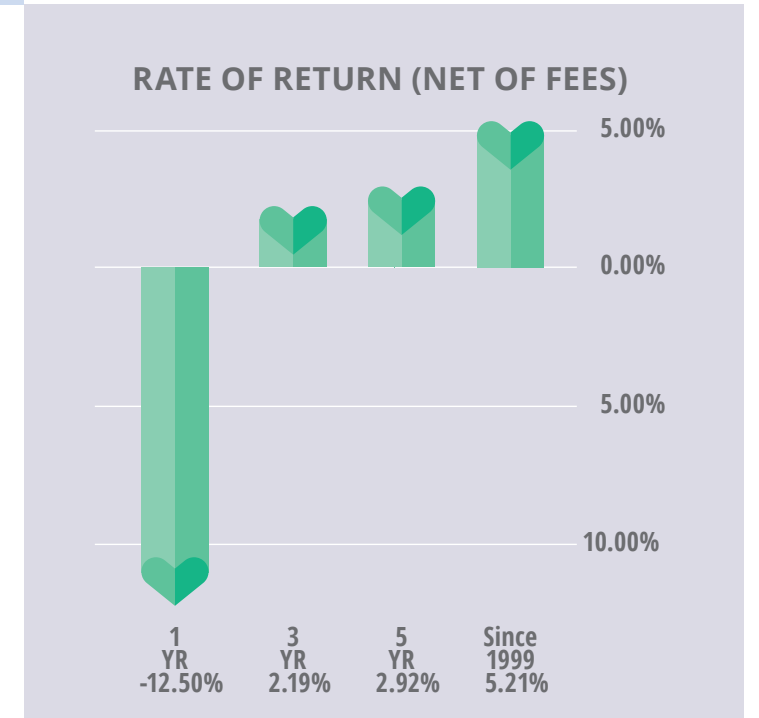
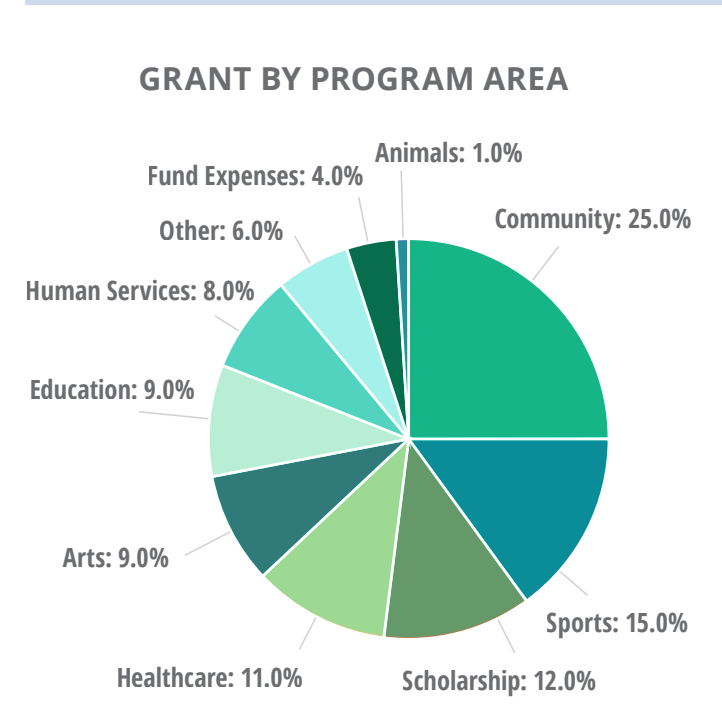
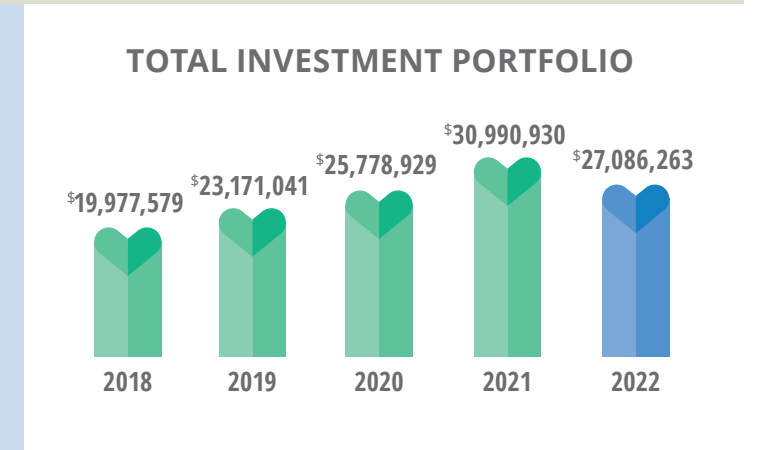
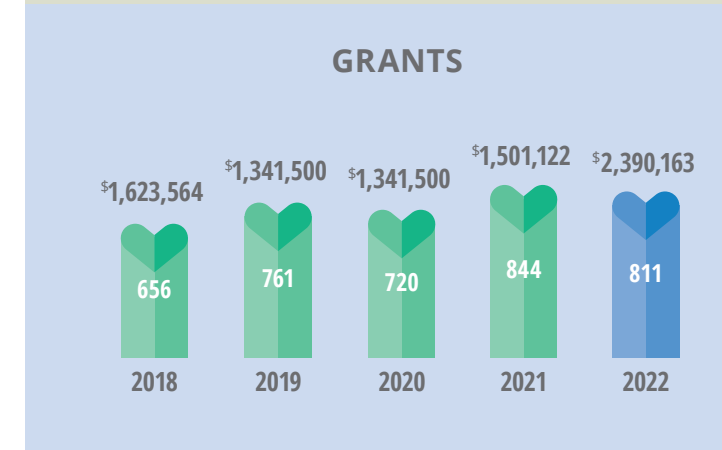
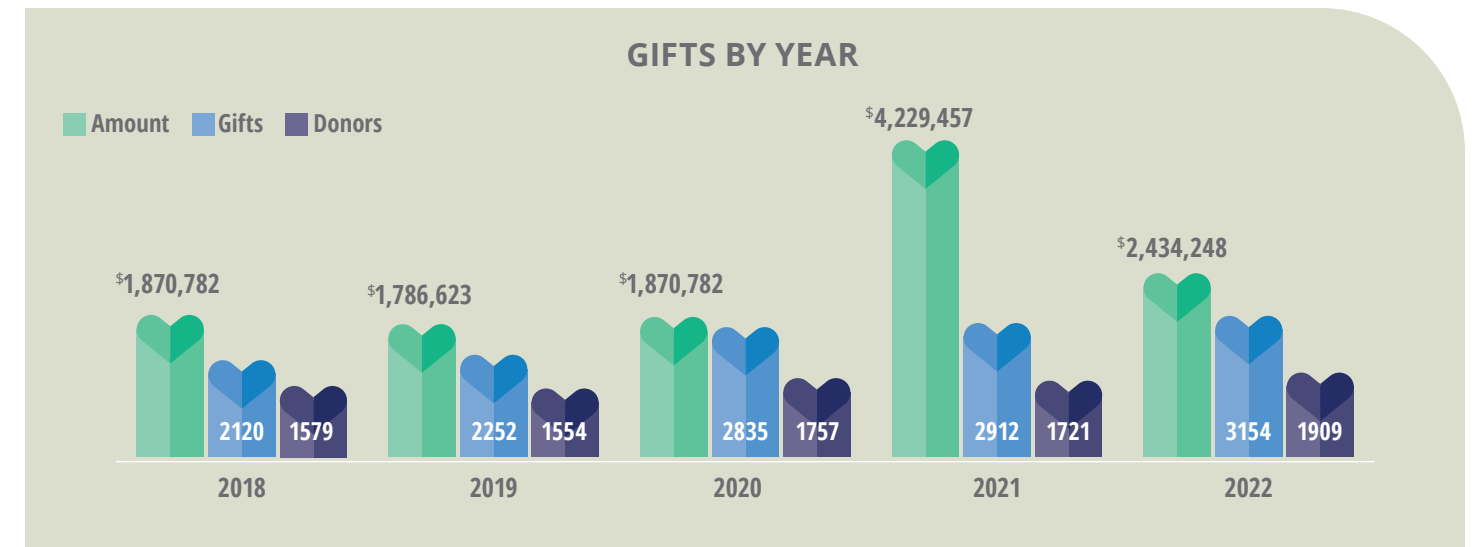
We believe that every single grant is a step towards making a difference for those in need.

The Heart of Olean

Philanthropy brings culturally enriching public arts project to Olean

In many ways, a matter of the heart served as the spark for the Heart of Olean Mural Project, a 10,000 square foot, four-sided mural in the heart of downtown Olean.

Likewise, it was the impact that a public arts project of such scale can have on the heart of an entire community that inspired the CRCF board of directors to provide two grants totaling \$20,000 as lead contributions to the project.

For the project's leading artist, Meg Saligman, a world-renowned mural artist and Olean native, the Heart of Olean is the fulfillment of a promise she made to her father, attorney Don Fish – a promise to create a painting that would hang above the mantle of his home.

When Fish passed away in 2021, before that painting could be produced, that mantle painting took on a whole new life and now covers four sides of the Jamestown Community College's Library and Liberal Arts Center.

The mural is an ode to Olean, featuring past, present and imagined future scenes of the Olean area, but it also features elements of surrealism, inspired by Robert Lax's poem *"The Circus in the Sun."*

Saligman partnered with the Tri-County Arts Council and a number of other community volunteers (and friends) like Paula Fox Derwick of Fox Financial to begin fundraising and planning efforts.

From the beginning, the project has lived up to its name and has been squarely, both physically and figuratively, at the heart of the Olean community.

Listening and planning sessions at the early phase of the project brought members of the community together to share stories and Olean history – and many of those stories now color the mural wall.

The project brought together the arts community, area businesses and nonprofits to not just fund, but collaborate in a way that made the project all the more meaningful and connecting.

Over 1,300 community volunteer painters (equaling 10% of the Olean population) touched the wall with their own brush strokes. Businesses across the Olean community hosted paint days where their employees and community members worked together to paint mural paper that was later transferred onto the mural wall.

In so many ways, the project embodied the most essential thing about the arts – the thing that goes deeper than general appreciation of a work of art – it fostered true connectivity between people from all different walks of life.

That connectivity is the healing aspect of art that encouraged the CRCF board of directors to make two grants of \$10,000, two of the year's largest grants, from the Olean Beautification Fund and Visual Arts Alliance Fund.

"To support a project of this scale was an incredible opportunity for our board of directors," said Lucy Benson, board president. "We believe that the arts celebrate history and heritage in a way that can be transformational, and we believe that the Heart of Olean Mural project has done just that."

A career of heartfelt philanthropy Karen Niemic Buchheit

For the last 12+ years, Karen Niemic Buchheit has been the steady hand and friendly face guiding the work of the Cattaraugus Region Community Foundation.

Buchheit is set to retire September 1, 2023, but she leaves behind a blueprint for the Foundation to continue its work in being the community's supportive, responsive and trusted leader in philanthropy.

At the center of that blueprint is a principle that has guided Buchheit's tenure: to operate with a heart centered on the true meaning of philanthropy and to steward giving and grantmaking that demonstrate love for mankind by working to make the world a better place for it.

When Buchheit started as executive director in 2010, the Foundation managed an asset base of about \$9 million and distributed \$420,000 in annual grants. Today, Foundation assets total more than \$27 million, composed of 300+ funds. In 2022 CRCF made possible over \$2.3 million in grants, its highest-ever annual grant total.

Since 2010, the Foundation has supported over \$13.9 million in grants and has stewarded over \$23.89 million in gifts. Behind those numbers though is Buchheit's true legacy at CRCF. Countless families have been able to preserve the memory of loved ones while giving back to causes important to them, including many scholarships that have allowed area students to pursue their dreams of higher education and meaningful careers.

In other areas, CRCF has supported the expansion of the Olean Food Pantry that allowed the pantry to better provide food access for the community's needy. It has been the fiscal partner behind the construction of what will soon be two permanent skateparks in Cattaraugus County. It has supported the largest scale public arts project in Cattaraugus County.

Perhaps most notably though, Buchheit spearheaded the local philanthropic response to the COVID-19 pandemic, mobilizing Foundation resources to establish and fundraise for the COVID-19 Response Fund for Cattaraugus County.

She helped coordinate other area funders to create a centralized philanthropic response that met immediate community needs and supported the organizations on the front-line of the pandemic.

She also led efforts to secure funding from other Western New York funders, including the Western New York COVID-19 Response Fund, the BlueFund and Ralph C. Wilson Jr. Foundation, to ensure that resources were steered to organizations where they were needed most.

All told, CRCF helped distribute over \$238,000 in grants that supported COVID-19 relief efforts.

Carol Stitt, the Foundation's first executive director and board president during the beginning of Buchheit's tenure praised Buchheit's vision for CRCF.

"Karen was always forward thinking, constantly designing and devising new programs to help CRCF be an even better partner for the greater Olean area," said Stitt.

"Twelve years ago, I received a phone call from a friend that Karen may be available and interested in our executive director position, and it has turned out to be one of the best phone calls I, and CRCF, have ever received," said Skip Wilday, CRCF's immediate past president.

"We are so fortunate as an organization and as a community to have had Karen's leadership over the last 12 years. Karen has been an incredible asset to CRCF and to our community's nonprofits and donors," continued Wilday. *"Her work with the Foundation has had a tremendous positive impact across the Cattaraugus County region, and we are honored to have had Karen lead the Foundation."*

Buchheit's work has impacted the nonprofit community of the Cattaraugus County region in many more areas than as just a funder. She has provided advice and support to many area nonprofits directly and helped make the Foundation an essential resource for nonprofit education and capacity building. Buchheit started Nonprofit Networking Day, the area's first conference devoted to nonprofit education and collaboration, and has since implemented CRCF's Nonprofit Link and Learn Seminar Series.

According to Wilday, while Buchheit's leadership will be greatly missed, her retirement comes at the right time. *"CRCF has never been stronger. We have an excellent and devoted board, a talented and capable staff and strong systems in place for Foundation operations,"* said Wilday. *"A blueprint has been laid for the next person to come in and be able to take CRCF to the next level."*

Buchheit's legacy with the Foundation will last in more than a professional capacity, as she established two funds at the Foundation, the Roger S. Niemic Memorial Fund in memory of her brother who died in 2017, and the Pete and Karen Buchheit Family Fund following the passing of her beloved husband Pete Buchheit in 2022.

"We will certainly miss her leadership as she transitions to a well-deserved retirement, but CRCF and the greater Olean area are much better and stronger from her tenure here," Stitt concluded.

Laine Outdoor Center at the heart of the community

Erick Laine was a constant figure in the Olean community, always at the heart of so much impacting the region, whether it be through business, philanthropy, volunteering or just being a friendly figure.

In the same way, the Erick Laine Outdoor Center, a \$5 million capital project at the Olean Family YMCA, will be at the heart of the community through all four seasons and for many years.

Phase I of the outdoor center will include a multi-use airnasium, which can be utilized year-round for sports, group exercise, theater productions, family birthday parties, etc; the Cutco splash park, which will convert into a winter play park for ice skating, curling and other outdoor winter activities; a welcome center and bath house; fire pits for gathering and socializing; then in Phase II a modern playground will be added for children to enjoy in spring 2024.

The outdoor center will be open to the community year-round and will not require a YMCA membership for families to enjoy.

Because of the center's incredible scope and it memorializing such an influential person in the community, the CRCF board of directors approved a \$10,000 matching grant to the project in 2022 during Cattaraugus Gives. All told, the grant helped the YMCA raise \$20,400 for the project during Cattaraugus Gives.

"Olean truly would not be what it is today if it were not for the forward thinking and giving spirit of Erick Laine," said CRCF Board President Lucy Benson. *"To see his legacy be honored by such a significant project really inspired our board to lend its support with this grant."*

"Erick was a lover of this community, and he was a lover of the outdoors, actively enjoying sports and activities in all four seasons like tennis, skiing and sailing," continued Benson. *"We can just imagine what it would mean to him to see all of the families enjoying such a special space throughout the year."*

The grant is also a recognition of Laine's generous giving to CRCF over the years, with his beloved wife Marianne Laine.

Erick and Marianne, with their son Peter Laine, were honored as the Friends of the Foundation in 2013.

In 2014, Erick and Marianne together established the Olean Parks Beautification Fund, to support landscaping and beautification work in Olean parks, especially Oak Hill Park. Through that fund, Erick and Marianne supported a \$160,000+ restoration of the 4th Street entrance to the park.

Through his estate, Erick established the Erick Laine Lift Up Endowment Fund, which supported \$15,000 in renovations to St. Bonaventure University's Innovation Center, now known as "The Hub," and which will continue to provide grants that

represent and honor Erick's values and his love for the Olean community by supporting increased educational opportunities for area residents and a vibrant Olean and Cattaraugus County business community.

Likewise, the Laine Outdoor Center capital project was inspired by a \$650,000 bequest from Laine.

"Through that gift from the Laine estate, a group of YMCA volunteers and staff was formed to ask the question; how can we honor Erick's legacy and respond to the needs of our community at the same time?" explained Jeff Townsend, YMCA CEO.

That dedicated group started exploring activities that Erick Laine loved and paired them with a recent community needs-assessment that the Y had conducted; which expressed the need for secured and safe outdoor play spaces and more outdoor winter activities.

Within those discussions and planning sessions, the concept for the Erick Laine Outdoor Center came to life.

"Erick gave so generously to this community during his life and through his estate, that it is only right to do our part in honoring that generosity," added Benson.

Construction on the Erick Laine Outdoor Center began recently after a March 2 groundbreaking ceremony and will continue through the spring and summer months, including the building of the airnasium, splash pad, fire pits and bathhouse facilities. The second phase will include the completion of the playground, with the opening set for spring 2024.

For many years to come, the Laine Outdoor Center will demonstrate how a philanthropic heart can impact the heart of an entire community.

Home is where the heart is Sandy and Connie Wolfinger

From humble beginnings to a successful career in forestry, Sandy and Connie Wolfinger have developed philanthropic hearts – hearts that have continued to grow since the couple established the Wolfinger Family Fund and the Connie and Sandy Wolfinger Fund at the Cattaraugus Region Community Foundation.

Born and raised in rural New Jersey to loving parents in a family of six, Sandy remembered having “*all of the necessities but few of the luxuries.*”

Sandy attended Penn State Mont Alto campus, which was established in 1903 as a forest academy, in his first collegiate year and attended the Penn State main campus for his final three years.

He would go on to become the first in his family to graduate from college thanks to the love and support of his parents. In honor of the support he received, he started his philanthropic actions at Mont Alto in 1994 by establishing the first lifetime endowment at the school and later established an endowment at the main campus as well.

“At the time I was there, I was married in my third year and had a child, so it was pretty tight economically,” he said. *“I was working and trying to pay for college while also trying to support a family.*

We lived in a small (8’ wide) used trailer at the time, and the heat didn’t always work, and the pipes froze,” he continued. *“To look at that versus where we are today, it’s quite a change.”*

The initial endowment fund led Sandy to discover the satisfaction of giving, knowing that his philanthropy in honor of his parents had an impact on Mont Alto and Penn State students when he received thank you notes and letters.

After graduating, Sandy began what would become a long and successful career in forest management and forestry consulting. He started his career working for R.B. Shannon & Associates (a consulting, engineering, surveying and forest firm), then Hammermill Paper Company in Smethport, PA, managing 54,000 acres of timberland.

After a decade with Hammermill he joined Southwest Forest Industries’ Mallery Sawmill division in Emporium, PA, where he advanced to vice president. Following a couple of decades in major forest industries, he started his own forestry consulting business, Northern Forests – specializing in the purchasing and managing of timberlands. Northern Forests, LLC has been operating successfully for over 30 years with business partners and wife and son, Connie and Shawn Wolfinger.

Connie, a native of Humphrey, NY, and an Ellicottville Central School graduate first met Sandy during her 30+ years as a real estate broker.

“Sandy and his companies were my best customers,” said Connie. *“What was unique was that I started out selling houses, condos and chalets, but I really had an interest in land. Most agents didn’t want to deal with land, so I developed that interest into a niche market.”*

That niche market led to Connie forming her company Field & Stream Real Estate, which retired only last year.

The two married, blending a family of three children and seven grandchildren. They first settled in Smethport, PA, and now live between Olean, Cuba and Portville, where the two love to entertain friends and family on the grounds of their Haskell manor.

Today, the Wolfingers use philanthropy to give back to an area and communities that they and their family love.

The Wolfinger Family Donor Advised Fund and the Connie and Sandy Wolfinger Fund make possible annual grants to organizations chosen by the Wolfingers, spanning from HomeCare and Hospice and Olean General Hospital to special beautification projects in Cuba, and much more.

Since 2019, the funds have together made possible nearly \$90,4016 in grants to community organizations.

The Wolfinger Family Donor Advised Fund also supports a grant program that provides funding to four area schools from which the Wolfingers’ grandchildren graduated as well as the Wolfinger/Wilhelm Grant Program which supports annual grants to Sandy’s native Belvidere school district in New Jersey.

For the Wolfingers, giving back to the communities and causes they love fills their hearts and since establishing their funds at CRCF, their philanthropy and their dedication to giving back has only grown.

“[The relationship] has broadened the scope of our philanthropy,” said Connie. *“We are always thinking of things, but the Foundation makes it simple for us.”*

While the scope and size of their giving maybe has changed since their early days of giving, the reason they continue to do so remains the same.

“We thought that when most of our important needs were taken care of, we would try to find some worthwhile causes we could support. And we hope that others will do the same when they are able.”

Giving heart to emergency medical care

The Randolph Regional EMS Corporation received a \$2,500 grant from CRCF's Community Fund for emergency response bags that will make operations simpler and safer for EMS providers to provide potentially lifesaving care. The emergency response bags allow paramedics to have all of the equipment they need to quickly and effectively respond to a patient's needs in one place. This cuts down on the need for paramedics to make repeat trips to an ambulance, which can quickly become a crowded workspace when administering care to patient and also helps improve response time. The emergency bags help support an EMS service that serves the towns of Randolph, Coldspring, South Valley, Napoli, Red House and Conewango. In 2021, Randolph Regional responded to 861 calls.

"This grant will have a significant impact on our ability to provide care to those suffering from a medical or traumatic emergency. This equipment will allow our EMTs and Paramedics to have lifesaving equipment including defibrillators, tourniquets, and medications such as Epinephrine and Narcan immediately to the patient's side to begin treatment in an organized fashion. This will allow our crews to easily locate critical equipment thus avoiding delays looking for those items in bags not designed for EMS use or returning to the ambulance to obtain equipment that does not fit in our current bags. We would not have been able to make these potentially lifesaving improvements without the assistance of the Community Foundation grant."
